A Little History

- ▣ ESEA – Elementary and Secondary Education Act – enacted 1965
- ▣ ESSA – Every Student Succeeds Act (2015), replaces No Child Left Behind Act (2002)
- ▣ New Hampshire’s Consolidated plan was approved by the US Department of Education in January 2018.

Assessment Regulations

States Receiving Federal Funds must continue annual statewide tests in reading/language arts and mathematics to all students in grades 3-8 and once in high school as well as science in at least once in each of grades 3-5, 6-9, and 10-12.

(Section 1111(b)(2) of the ESEA)

Assessment Requirements

- ▣ Requires that each state implement high-quality, valid, reliable and fair annual assessments that are the same for all students in the State.
- ▣ Requires that assessments be aligned with the full breadth and depth of State academic content standards.
- ▣ Requires that assessments measure student achievement based on challenging college- and career-ready State academic achievement standards.

NH's Assessments

- ▣ NH SAS (Statewide Assessment System)
 - Summative: grades 3-8 ELA and Mathematics
 - ▣ Grades 5, 8 and 11 Science
 - Interim Assessments – used by teachers and schools to determine how students are progressing at specific intervals throughout the school year.
 - Modulars – used by teachers to inform them as to how students are performing on specific skills.

PACE

- ▣ Innovative Assessment and Accountability Demonstration Authority granted by the US Department of Education under ESSA.
(fully defined on page 84 of the ESSA)
- ▣ Provided an innovative approach for assessing students against its challenging academic standards.
- ▣ NH's application was approved in September 2018

An Innovative Assessment

- ▣ The NH DOE uses the term “PACE School” as those schools using the innovative assessment for **accountability**.
- ▣ Currently there are 7 districts (1 district has only 1 school) and 6 schools participating in the project.

Performance Assessments

- ▣ Performance Assessments are local assessments that can and should be used by all schools as an authentic way of assessing a student's knowledge in any subject area.
- ▣ PACE schools use these assessments for **accountability** purposes, all other schools may be using them as a known best practice for instruction.

A Balanced Approach

- ▣ Traditional Assessment helps answer the question, “Do you know it?”
- ▣ Performance Assessments helps answer the question, “How well can you use what you know?”
- ▣ A balance of the two provides teachers with the full picture of what students know and are able to do.
- ▣ Gives more authentic feedback to parents about the continuum of learning.

To Compare Each

PERFORMANCE ASSESSMENTS

- ▣ Are used in any classroom
- ▣ Are used in any subject
- ▣ Locally Developed
- ▣ Administered and Scored by Teachers
- ▣ Used to make determinations about a student's understanding around a skill or standard

PACE FOR ACCOUNTABILITY

- ▣ Used as an accountability tool to determine student proficiency levels
- ▣ Common Tasks are Developed by teachers in the project with expertise given from The Center of Assessment
- ▣ Common Tasks are used for calibration purposes

Continued

PACE

- ▣ Rigorous application of knowledge
- ▣ Show not tell
- ▣ Allows demonstration of knowledge and skill
- ▣ Provides a foundation for differentiation instruction.
- ▣ Teachers locally develop other performance assessments that go into determinations about student proficiency
- ▣ Proficiency scores are determined from grades, teacher judgments, and calibration work.

School Day SAT

- ▣ Taken by high school juniors
- ▣ NH DOE has an active contract with College Board whereby the state pays for every junior in the state to take the SAT one time, in their junior.
- ▣ Students must take the test on the School Day determined by the State
- ▣ Saturday administration cannot take the place of the School Day for accountability.

Dynamic Learning Maps

- ▣ States must provide an alternate test for students with the most significant cognitive disabilities.
- ▣ The number of students taking this test must not exceed 1% of the total number of students eligible to test in any given year.
- ▣ This test is based on alternate achievement state standards.
