## **Public Comment:**

There was a lively discussion from attending public members and the committee on several issues regarding concerns in the Franklin School System. These included: -Discussion about the city being able to increase the percentage of tax dollars to the school – recognition that improvement needs to be made in this area

-The challenge of students reaching middle and high school with limited reading ability

-High turnover of teachers every year

-The "unfunded mandates" that the state requires with regard to reporting, etc.

-The consideration of contract teachers to fill gaps in curriculum versus hiring a full-time teacher with full benefits – potential cost savings

- Use of a "math interventionist" to assist students struggling with understanding math: under study at Winnisquam High School

-Better use of the Huot Career and Technical Center in Laconia by our Franklin students

- Possible use of more Colby-Sawyer students in classroom as a relationship is already in place between the city and the school

-Accountability – do not pass on students who are not ready to move up to the next grade -make sure students entering middle school are able to read and do math close to grade level

-Look at the contracting out of Food Service vis-à-vis the recent action taken in Conway – are there any savings to be made

-Should city consider consolidation of Buildings and Grounds services

-Understanding why parents sent kids to charter/private schools – behavior, environment, classes, etc.

-Can the Franklin Public School system learn from them to encourage kids to stay in the public-school arena

-What opportunities exist within the city and school district to consolidate functions and work together to simplify operations such as finances; payroll, buying of school and office supplies; buildings and grounds maintenance; lawn care and snow removal; single medical plan for city and school employees where numbers of eligible might provide savings and keep a consistent system for all employees, etc.

-Extended Learning Opportunities for our High School students. Hinsdale Middle High School in Hinsdale NH has a very robust program and is willing to come to Franklin in the fall to talk with us and present a program with some of their students who have been successful in the Hinsdale ELO program.

# **Review of State Data:**

Due to the late arrival of Tony Schinella, the data report discussion was abbreviated. This data Included: expenditures of cities, towns, and school districts of like- ize communities to Franklin (pupils, per pupil spending, town/city line items like public safety and ambulance service, etc.); current Franklin enrollment and the 11-year downward trend; regional versus stand-alone high schools; the distances Franklin students would travel by bus to attend the closest regional high schools; Franklin's current teacher expenditure and contract schedule as well as admin and other salary data; tax rates and valuation rates, and other data.

The Granite Institute Study – How New Hampshire Provides Small Towns with Access to Schools – was also shared with members via email.

As data from similar sized communities was reviewed, discussion about both school and town/city funding methods ensued. However, as this was just an initial discussion, a fuller understanding of the spending of like sized communities is very much ongoing as the 2018/2019 budgets are now being finalized. We do hope to learn how to find more monies for our school system.
