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Fire Department - New Engine 1

he new, bright red, Engine 1 is equipped with the most modern firefighting capabilities and safety features. The new truck holds 1,000 gallons of water, 30 gallons of firefighting foam, and an on-board generator. It has many other hand-tools and devices used to protect our City. Engine 1 will have seating capacity for five firefighters. The current engine 1 only has seating for two firefighters.

Engine 1 was purchased through a local dealer, Dingee Machine Company in Cornish, NH. It is being manufactured by the Sutphen Corporation in Dublin, Ohio. Sutphen is the longest standing fire apparatus



manufacturer and has been building fire engines for 127 years. Believe it or not, folks with the Sutphen name still answer the telephone when you call the manufacturing plant. Engine 1 is projected to be in service and responding to emergency incidents by April 15th. Our firefighters would like to thank our Taxpayers, City Council and City Administration for supporting the purchase of this much needed apparatus.

THE HISTORY of the Engine 1's of Franklin

FRANKLIN FIRE DEPARTMENT

HISTORY OF ENGINE No. 1

The original Engine no. 1 was purchased by the City of Franklin in 1853. It was a hand drawn Hunnaman Engine. It had a fiveinch cylinder, 24 feet of suction hose, buckets, axes, spanners and lanterns.

The new Engine was designated Engine No. 1. The new company ran with 50 men and would serve until 1892 when the old Engine was retired and held in reserve.

AMERICAN LAFRANCE 1922

On March 13, 1922, a new American LaFrance triple combination truck arrived in the City. It was a 75 HP, type 10, 4-cylinder truck with a type 39 pump.

The Daniel Webster Steamer became Engine Company No. 1 at that time, assigned to the new American LaFrance.

It was reported that the LaFrance did not serve the community well. The truck had its mechanical problems.

It was at this time, that the American LaFrance Company recommended a truck swap, the old 1922 LaFrance for a new 1925 LaFrance.

The City felt that they could not pass up this opportunity. It would cost the City \$3,500 to trade for the new pumper.

Fire Department Captain Samuel Davis Recognition

The Franklin Public Library is proud to offer its customers access to the New Hampshire Downloadable Books Consortium. The Consortium, organized by the State Library, provides more than 18,000 ebooks and more than 8,000 audiobooks through OverDrive. The OverDrive app is free of charge and the e-books and audiobooks are free to use as well. Each customer may borrow three titles at a time and have access to them for two

weeks at a time. Anyone with a computer, smartphone, tablet, Kindle, or other mp3 player may enjoy the ease of use, convenience, and mobility at no cost to them. In order to provide access to the collection, the Library pays an annual fee based on usage to the Consortium. Access to the collection requires a valid library card. 

Municipal Services Department

Snow and Ice Control Operations

Since November 21, 2016 to February 27, 2017 the Municipal Services Department has conducted 31 snow and ice control operations. Also 3 snow removal operations in the business areas. During the entire winter of 2015/2016 we conducted nineteen snow and ice control operations and two snow removal operations. What was my prediction in the January 2017 newsletter? "Be Prepared - Mother Nature will be making up for the summer drought " and it is most certainly doing so! March is the transition month. Mud and potholes are on the platter.

Leaf pick-up

Unfortunately the month of November into December set us far behind schedule on leaf pickup. A combination of a late leaf drop; numerous rain events and then the early snowfalls prevented us from proceeding as quickly as we typically do. As mentioned before, the Highway Department usually has a crew of four assigned to this detail and it becomes more difficult to remain on schedule when weather interferes and other unforeseen emergencies pull the leaf crew off to do other jobs. This past fall we completed Fridays trash route and about two-thirds of Wednesdays route is done. We plan to continue in the spring finishing Wednesdays and Monday's trash routes. We will not be going back over the areas completed last fall. It would be a great help for residents that are able to assist by delivering your leaves to the transfer station. My hopes are the snow melts early and we are able to begin pickup the first week of April. I will provide you with our scheduled start date in the April newsletter.

MSD - City Council Workshop

There is a City Council Workshop scheduled for Monday, March 27th at the City Hall Council Chambers. The subject is the Municipal Services Department with a particular focus on the Water and Sanitary Sewer Divisions of the Department. It would be great to see a full house. The workshop involves a presentation ending with a question and answer session.

Freeze and Thaw Cycle

One of our greatest challenges in the early spring is potholes and mud. Typically if you see standing water on a road, a pothole will develop as a result of the "Freeze Thaw Cycle". Unpaved dirt roads can also create challenges during mud season. For those unfamiliar with mud and potholes I will give you the scoop. When the ground freezes and frost begins, it freezes from the surface down to whatever the final depth of frozen ground may become, in any given winter season. This year there appears to be two to three feet of frost in the ground. When the ground surface begins to thaw it likewise thaws from the surface down to the depth of the frost line. The result is that there is no where for water to percolate into the ground so it lies on top of the frost line thus creating standing water and mud. Sometimes lots of it!

Inflow and Infiltration Reduction Program

We recently interviewed three engineering firms to perform a "City Sanitary Sewer Assessment." This assessment is part of our ongoing process to identify and eliminate as much fresh, non-wastewater, which finds its way into the 27 miles of City Sewer Mains. This is otherwise known as Inflow and Infiltration (I and I). The importance of reducing I and I is that the Winnipesaukee River Basin Program, the State owned and operated wastewater collection system and the River Street wastewater treatment is in the process of changing a thirty seven year old, antiquated billing formula. There are ten member communities that are part of the program which generate an average of 4.5 million gallons of wastewater per day. When it rains and if the groundwater table is high, conditions due to I and I result. The new billing formula will be based on total waste water flow, thus the more non-wastewater we can eliminate from entering the sewer system the cheaper our quarterly invoice will be. The Municipal Services Department has been in the process of identifying and implementing our "Inflow and Infiltration Reduction Program". This study will be the culmination of five years of work to get us to the point we can perform flow metering to various segments of our sanitary sewer system. Subsequent to the study will be the design, bid and construction phases to eliminate excessive amounts of I and I from specific areas. Hopefully we will receive grant funding and work with the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Road Sweeper

We are getting ready to pull the road sweeper out of winter storage and hope to start getting the winter sand picked up. How quick we can get roads swept depends on how much we had to sand during the winter. The more sand the slower the going. We plan on getting this underway as soon as the ice is completely melted from the road surface. Mid-March appears to be a good target date.

Miscellaneous Projects

Other spring projects all evolve around post winter cleanup. Cleaning and servicing equipment; filling potholes; sweeping sidewalks and getting mowing equipment ready are but a few of the seasonal chores. You would be amazed at how much time, money and effort evolves around the winter season. It is a year round process and then the snow all melts!

How time goes by. Can you believe we started writing monthly newsletters in March of 2016? This is my 13th edition. I welcome requests to write about a topic that may be of interest to our readers, so any subject pertaining to the Municipal Services Department would be great. We greatly appreciate the support you have given us this winter.

Northern Pass Receives Key Approvals from NH Environmental

Northern Pass reached another significant milestone on March 1, when the NH Department of Environmental Services (DES) issued four key approvals of the project. DES's decisions pertained to the Wetland, Shoreland and alteration of Terrain Permits, and the 401 Water Quality Certificate. The approvals are essential components of the State siting project being conducted by the NH Site Evaluation Committee (NH SEC), according to DES, mark the conclusion of the agency's review of the projects siting application. The NH SEC is scheduled to render a final decision on the Northern Pass application later this year.
