Since December 9, 2018 to March 30, 2018 the Municipal Services Department has conducted 54 Snow and Ice Control Operations. During the entire winter of 2015/2016 we conducted 22 Snow and Ice Control Operations. It has been a roller coaster of a ride this past winter season! Is it over?

A major drainage project is scheduled to begin in mid to late April. "The Haynes Brook Box Culvert Replacement Project" involves the replacement of the vintage 1938 failed culvert located in close proximity to Hannaford's on Central Street. This job will last about 12 weeks beginning in late April and may result in significant traffic delays. The project is 75% funded by a FEMA Hazard Mitigation Grant to the City of Franklin. Your patience is needed. If you are able to seek an alternate route please do so. I will provide a monthly update as work moves forward towards completion.

Spring Yard Cleanup - Leaves can be disposed of at the Leaf Drop-off Area which is located on Rescue Road. Rescue Road is just before the entrance to the Transfer Station. LEAVES ONLY PLEASE. Clean brush and Clean Wood waste is accepted within the Transfer Station Complex and does NOT include anything that has been treated or painted and is limited to typical non-leaf yard waste

Due to the harsh winter, City roads and equipment have taken a beating and the Crew is tired. Every overnight or prolonged storm is stressful and difficult on the crew which maintains 124 lane miles of roads, 12 City parking lots; 27 miles of sidewalks; water pumping stations and many other City facilities. By the time March arrives, it gets old and we all look forward to the end of it all. I have great respect and appreciation for our "DEPARTMENT TEAM" and the personal sacrifices they all make to keep our roads and public facilities safe and accessible. This is not an easy job. For much of the crew, just the anticipation and preparation leading up to a winter weather event is mentally and physically challenging!

There is a significant amount of work to do this spring. Cleanup of winter sand from our sidewalks and streets is a priority. Gravel roads need grading. Pavement markings need repainting. Drains need to be cleaned. Potholes filled. Litter picked up. Catch basins rebuilt. Service Requests taken care of. Signposts straightened out and signs replaced. Equipment needs to be ready for the upcoming, six month construction season. Parks and ball fields must be ready for spring sports. A lot to do in a short period of time! All 7 Divisions of the Municipal Services Department will be very busy.

In December 2016 we interviewed three engineering firms to perform a "City of Franklin, NH, Sanitary Sewer Assessment". Underwood Engineering was awarded the contract. In the spring of 2017, flow data was collected to identify areas of fresh water intrusion into our wastewater collection system known as Inflow and Infiltration (I+I). Excessive non-waste water entering the sewer collection system ultimately flows to the Waste Water Treatment Plant thus we are trying to identify and eventually eliminate as much as feasible. This is a major step towards identifying failed areas of our City sewer collection system. Franklin's Municipal Waste Water Collection System is permitted by the United States Environmental Protection Agency (USEPA). Our findings thus far are that approximately 72% of the waste water being treated is fresh water. I will keep you updated as we move forward with the study.

NON FLUSHABLE ITEMS: With modern marketing of many new products comes with it the problem of items that are not biodegradable and are categorized as solid waste. Non-flushable items that are disposed of into the toilet create major issues as they get stuck in pipes and eventually clog up sewer lines which effect sewer service to homes, businesses and ultimately the City Sanitary Sewer Collection System and the Waste Water Treatment Plant.

NONFLUSHIBLE PRODUCTS INCLUDE: under garments; diapers, wipes, Paper towels, medical supplies such as syringes, condoms, cigarette butts, dental floss, Etc. Such items are considered solid waste and must be bagged and disposed of in your trash.

Many may ask if our City drinking water is safe. The City Water Department is classified as a "Public Water System". As a result, we must meet stringent guidelines established by the United States Environmental Protection Agency.

We operate a federally licensed public water system established as a result of the 1972 "Clean Water Act". This ensures that public drinking water meets safe drinking water standards. We sample our drinking water every other week for bacteria, e-coli and other forms of contaminants. In addition, we sample for synthetic and organic chemicals, PFOA's, lead and copper. We draw over 244 water samples annually which are then tested in a certified lab and the results provided to the New Hampshire Department Environmental Services Drinking Water Bureau. OUR WATER IS SAFE and meets federally established requirements.

Most people are unaware as to what it takes to provide safe drinking water at adequate pressure requirements for domestic use by homeowners and to meet hydrant flows for fire protection. Over the past 14 years the City has had no choice but to upgrade various components of our aging water distribution system. Because of the City's topography we operate a complex system with three separate pressure zones, five water tanks, five pumping stations, 57 miles of pipe, 4 well fields and a water treatment plant which has been online since July of 2012. In September of 2015 the Franklin Water Department was named "Water Utility of the Year" by the New England Water Works Association. The major challenge we face is that our 2,422 customers must support the operation, maintenance and capital costs to operate, maintain and improve the system. Our average daily demand is 549,000 gallons of water. Unfortunately, our customer base is **disproportionate** to the vast amount of infrastructure in place that we must maintain.

This has a significant impact on our water rates and the resulting revenue it takes to operate and maintain the system. The cost of produce 748 gallons of safe drinking water is currently \$6.45. Consider what a bottle or gallon of store purchased water cost?

One of two projects planned for the Water Department is the replacement of the Pleasant Street Pressure Reducing Vault. The vault is located adjacent to the southerly lane of Pleasant Street in proximity to the Mountain Ridge Assisted Living Facility. This is a critical piece of water infrastructure and the project is partially funded by the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services under the Drinking Water State Revolving Fund. During construction work we will encroach into the southerly lane of Pleasant Street. There will be times that traffic control is in place and the roadway reduced to one lane. Work will take place for approximately a two week period beginning in June.

A second undertaking in the Water Department will be the rehabilitation of the Sanbornton Pumping Station. This will involve the replacement of the original 1942 pumps and associated mechanical components and is necessary to ensure adequate water supply for both fire protection and water customers. An update on this project will be provided in the May newsletter.

Finally the Municipal Services Department Staff is developing estimates to deal with repairs to various streets and the Central Street Daniell Bridge. Like most municipalities around the State of New Hampshire,

the City of Franklin has its' share of challenges with respect to roadway repair and maintenance! This is especially the case based on the severity of this past winter.

The Municipal Services Department recently hired two new employees.

Jeff Lutz has joined our two person Mechanical Division. Jeff is came from 1st Student and has numerous certifications and over 30 years of experience. He was able to hit the road running and has a CDL-D license.



David Amero has been hired in the Water Department. David came from Pinard Waste and has numerous certifications. David had a CDL-A/D License.
