The Quality life in Franklin Hinges on our Public Services Departments

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Imagine a municipality void of essential public services such as Public Works and Public Safety. It is difficult to envision this however; in the last 125 years our society has become accustomed to and highly dependent on some form of municipal government to provide a variety of essential public services. These services are meant to ensure that it's Citizens; Businesses and the General Public live in a world we have become accustomed to, rely on and expect. Public Works Department's nationwide build, operate and maintain infrastructure of all types which guarantee service delivery essential towards maintaining an acceptable "quality of life" that most of us take for granted. Public Works Departments just like it's equivalent, the Franklin's Municipal Services Department, must be prepared for natural disasters and emergency response 24/7, year-round.

Essential to a healthy and sanitary environment is an adequate supply of safe potable drinking water for human consumption and fire protection. Water capacity and quality are also necessary if Franklin wishes to attract various industries and commercial activities; schools; recreational facilities and other institutions.

Sanitary commercial and residential properties must be free of rodents and vector which have the potential of creating major health hazards. We as consumers discard 30% of our food waste. The clean and safe collection, processing and disposal of household items and that generated by commercial and industrial activities are a second major responsibility important to an essential service the City provides. Franklin generates 15,000 tons per year solid waste. It is managed; picked up; sorted and then transported to properly permitted and specialized disposal and recycling facilities on an ongoing basis.



Public Services cover story continued...

Franklin currently disposes of an estimated 2.9 million gallons per day of raw sewerage containing untreated residential, commercial and industrial wastewater which flows to the State operated wastewater treatment plant. Prior to 1970 there were over 17 direct discharge points where raw wastewater was discharged by the City, into the Winnepesaukee and Pemigewasett Rivers. The State of New Hampshire had a major statewide environmental problem on their hands with many of its lakes and rivers polluted with toxic wastes. This was common practice up until 1972 when extensive work was underway by the Franklin Municipal Services Department on eliminating this public health hazard. Municipal Services provided planning and construction oversight. We are now fortunate to have the capacity to handle additional industrial, commercial and residential wastewater. This is the result of long-term planning which took place fifty years ago.

With respect to our local highways and the multitude of utilities buried above or below ground within these public ways, numerous utility companies rely on our roadway network to locate transmission and distribution lines to businesses, industry and our homes. Commuters, school busses, emergency vehicles, delivery trucks of all sizes that must supply our commercial and industrial facilities with goods and services rely on our highways for commerce and transport. Public safety vehicles need safe emergency access. Winter snow and ice can be with us from November into April. During the winter season, public works crews are the frontline workforce, during all forms of winter weather events to keep our roads safe and passable.

The Buildings and Grounds Division of the Municipal Services Department provides various services to keep our municipal buildings and facilities safe, accessible and operable. Municipal buildings are where City staff arrive daily to conduct business and to serve the public. Typically, these spaces have high foot traffic, require parking, and must be maintained year-round for ongoing public use. Recreational facilities; the Police and Fire Stations, City Hall, Transfer Station and many more public buildings, walking sidewalks, playgrounds, ball fields and parks are used now more than ever requiring the upkeep and maintenance necessary for safe and continued use by the public.

Essential to all of our major department's is the need for safe operating municipal vehicles and construction equipment. Several of Franklin's departments are open all the time and City vehicles get constant use. The Municipal Services Department performs regular repair and maintenance to over 80 City owned vehicles. This important segment of our department is sometimes overlooked but without our Mechanical Division tending to vehicle repairs the City would be hard pressed to deliver the services they are charged with providing.

All of the aforementioned activities must be regularly coordinated which take both short- and long-term planning. Special infrastructure related projects are considered and prioritized in order to accommodate future residential, commercial and industrial capacity for City services. Some take years to plan, fund, design and construct. Our small but amazing Municipal Services Department Staff works tirelessly every day orchestrating the constantly changing needs of the community. ★

The Franklin Fire Department has seen a sudden increase in Emergency Incidents as we approach a close to summer. Our firefighters respond to an average of five emergency incidents per day. However, on August 7th, our crews responded to a total of fifteen emergency incidents in one 24 hour period! These types of days are taxing on services, however the Franklin Fire Department Team did a great job managing the communities' emergencies.

As summer comes to an end, we would like to remind everyone to start thinking about having your heating appliances, wood stoves, and other similar equipment serviced. This is often an overlooked task, and as a result can lead to the production of hazardous gases to include Carbon Monoxide. A licensed professional can verify that your equipment is safe and ready to use when needed in the colder weather. With this, be sure to verify that you have working smoke and Carbon Monoxide detectors in your home.

On August 13th, we took delivery of our new ambulance. The new ambulance will replace our 2007 Horton, which has been a great vehicle for many years. You will see our EMT's and Paramedics in the new Ambulance 2, caring for the sick and injured, this September. Stay tuned for pictures upon its completion.

On a final note, as our students return to their classrooms, please remember to have a talk regarding safety. With all of the dangers facing our students, it is important to educate them on potential hazards that they face. We look forward to doing our part to educate the younger students this fall during Fire Prevention Week, while working with our school partners to develop safety drills to help reinforce a culture of safety. 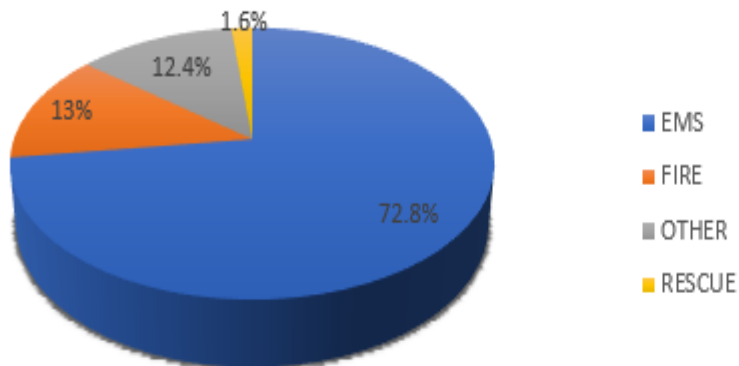

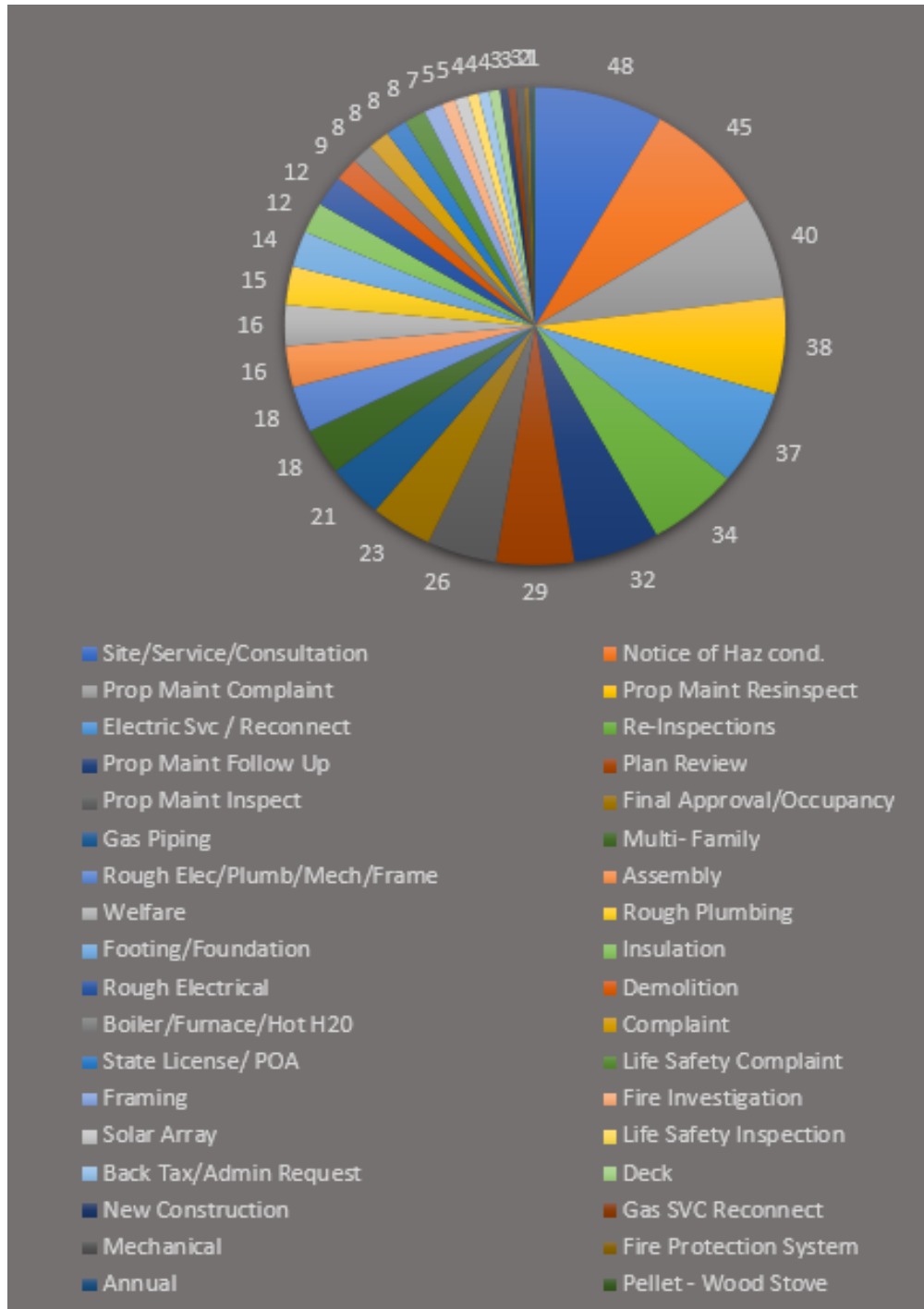
