he Franklin Police Department was awarded a certificate of outstanding performance on April 13, from The United States Attorney's Office for the District of Maine for their thorough investigation in the case of the United States v. Joseph Richards, Crystal Dufault and Neil West. These related cases involved the prosecution of Richards, Dufault and West for the August 3, 2015 armed bank robbery of Norway Savings Bank in Freeport, Maine; the August 14, 2015 armed bank robbery of Franklin Savings Bank in Franklin, N.H.; the September 4, 2015 armed bank robbery of University Credit Union in Portland; and the September 12, 2015 armed bank robbery of TD Bank in Lewiston, Maine. The TD Bank robbery resulted in a high-speed chase which reached speeds in excess of 100 miles per hour and culminated in Saco. Following the chase, West and Richards were

arrested. At the time they committed these robberies, both West and Richards were on federal supervised release for prior bank robbery convictions. The investigation of this multirobbery case involved the execution of several search warrants, obtaining photographic and video evidence, interviewing numerous victims and witnesses and listening to hundreds of jail calls. The success of the case was due in large part to skillful coordination among all of the local, state and federal agencies involved. Joseph Richards pled guilty in January 2016 and was sentenced to 15 years in prison on September 14, 2016. Crystal Dufault pled guilty in December, 2015 and was sentenced to 36 months in prison on October 4, 2016. Neil West Sr. was found guilty in July of 2016 following a jury trial in US District Court of armed bank robbery and conspiracy to commit bank robbery. West was sentenced to 14-1/2 years on November 30, 2016,



Continued from pg. 2- Trestle View Park

There are two important outdoor connections between the City of Franklin and the Winnipesaukee River. One is Trestle View Park. Located at the Sanborn Bridge on Central Street, this park was made possible by the generous gift by the Grevior Family. The park land was once privately owned and a restaurant was located there. It burned in the late 1990's, and the Grevior family acquired the land, and in 2002 they donated it to the City for the establishment of the park. The gift of the land was used as a match for a grant from the NH Land and Water Conservation Fund to construct the park. Local businesses, Franklin Savings Bank and Beck & Belluci to name two, contributed assistance to make Trestle View Park a reality.

The second connection is the Winnipesaukee River Trail, which was also made a reality due to the dedication and hard work provided by concerned citizens and businesses. The Trail, which runs from Trestle View Park to the Town of Tilton along the river, is used for walking and biking. Both the Park and the Trail will be important parts of the overall revitalization efforts now underway in the City.

Tis the Season - heavy rainfall at a rate of over 1" per hour **c**an wreak havoc with City road shoulders resulting in washouts. It is a great help to our limited highway crew if you can assist by keeping storm water drains and driveway culverts free of debris which obstructs water flow. This would help year round and especially when heavy rainfall is expected.

• Updated City Website

City Departments are in the process of updating their websites. We are working on providing more thorough and updated information about the MSD seven division department. A section will be added entitled "Frequently Asked Questions" (FAQ). Your patience during the process of redesigning the site is appreciated.

• Curbside Trash and Recycling Pickup

Regular updates are available on the 'Solid Waste Hotline' by contacting 603-934-4103 extension 12. In the event your curbside trash or recycling cans are not picked up it could be due to unforeseen factors which happen infrequently. If this happens leave your can(s) out as we will pick up the following day.

• Empty Cans Removed Promptly from Roadside

All three curbside trash and recycling routes require the emptying of well over 1,000 trash and recycling containers each per week. This equates to 3,000 dumps per week for trash and 3,000 dumps per week for recycling. For this reason it is imperative that once emptied, the containers should be promptly brought in off the road. Also, it is a great help to put cans out only when they are full. This avoids the unnecessary dumps of half full and empty containers and saves on equipment wear and tear.

City Sanitary Sewer Assessment

In December 2016, we interviewed three engineering firms to perform the "City Franklin, NH, Sanitary Sewer Assessment " Underwood Engineering was awarded the contract and flow meters have been installed on schedule. On March 15th, we initiated the collection of flow data to identify areas of fresh water intrusion (I and I) into our wastewater collection system. Our first set of results from mid-March to Mid-April flow data was reviewed on Thursday, April 27th. As of June 23rd all the flowmeters have been removed. You will get a progress report and more comprehensive update in the August newsletter as we anticipate phase one of the assessment to be complete.

• Public Drinking Water System

Annually USEPA requires that all public drinking water systems submit an annual "Consumer Confidence Report" to the customers of a public drinking water system. This report was mailed to the "Owner of Record" for each property connected to a public water system. We recently completed our annual report and it was mailed out in mid-June. It is also available on the City Website; posted in Municipal Buildings and available at the Municipal Services Department Office, 43 West Bow Street in Franklin, NH 603 -934-4103.

• Dedicated Citizen Jeff Perkins

Over the past few years, Jeff has been walking City streets doing litter pickup. His efforts have resulted in well over a thousand bags of litter being removed from Franklin's highways. Without this assistance from Jeff, we would not have litter free public ways. His assistance is appreciated.

• Spring Road Work

Spring work on several road projects is well underway. The 1.8 mile section of Prospect Street from #305 Prospect to the Northfield town line has been completely rebuilt. We have started work on Woodrow Avenue; Sanborn Street from Kendall Street to Babbitt Road; and will be completing these along with the section of Terrace Road from Pleasant Street to Davis Street by mid-July. At that point we will move to Davis Street for full depth reconstruction.

• Solid Waste Disposal

Over the past three months a record amount of all types of solid waste was processed through the Transfer Station. Demolition debris, electronics, tires, brush and leaves are some of the major quantities we are processing. The volume of solid waste processed demonstrates that property owners are performing major cleanup. Please keep up the good work of eliminating unwanted trash, furniture, tires and all other types of accumulated debris from your property.

Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day

Household hazardous waste collection day is on July 29th, from 8:30 AM until NOON at the Municipal Services Department located at 43 West Bow Street. Please see our posting on the Franklin City website for full details.

WATER SAFETY!

Wearing a Life Jacket Can Save Your Life

To ensure you survive unexpected slips or falls overboard wear your life jacket, because it buys you time to be rescued. It only takes an adult an average of 60 seconds to drown and on average it takes 10 minutes for a strong swimmer to put on a life jacket after entering the water. If you will not wear it for yourself then wear it for those who love you.



What if...

Someone you were with fell out of a boat without their life jacket'

You can follow these four basics steps to help: REACH, THROW, ROW and GO.

1. REACH: Hold on to the dock or your boat and reach your hand, a boat oar, a fishing pole, or whatever you have nearby, to the person

2. THROW: If you can't reach far enough, toss things that float for the person to grab

3. ROW: If you're in a boat, use the oars to move the boat closer to the person in the water, or call out to a nearby boat for help. Don't use the boat's motor close to a person in the water, they could be injured by the propeller

4. DON'T GO: Don't go into the water unless you are trained. Call out for help Remember, even a strong swimmer can drown trying to help others. If all else fails, go for help!

Watch Your Children

You may not expect your child to reach overboard or turn the boat key to see what might happen so be alert. It takes an average of 20 seconds for a child to drown so always make them wear a life jacket and never take your eyes off of them around water.

Drowning is a Silent Killer

An estimated 60% of all drownings are witnessed, because people are unable to identify the four signs of a <u>drowning victim</u>. Signs are head back (bobs up and down above/below the surface), mouth open, **no sound** and arms outstretched moving simultaneously in an above-the-water, up and down stroke that appears as if they are slapping or playing in the water.



<u>RIVER SAFETY!</u> Swollen rivers and streams are VERY DANGEROUS. It may seem very appealing to enter the river on a hot summer day. River currents can sweep a swimmer away in seconds. Only trained kayakers should navigate the water. ALWAYS WEAR A LIFE JACKET!

DANGER SIGNS-

- 1. High water
- 2. Muddy water
- 3. Debris in water
- 4. Ground erosion
- 5. White water

Franklin Parks & Recreation Department Programs & Activities - Summer 2017

The Franklin Parks and Recreation's Summer Program is based out of the Bessie Rowell Community Center. The Bessie Rowell Community Center provides ample room for both sunny day and rainy day activities. With multiple classrooms, the gym, and the stage, our participants have plenty of space to spread out and take part in a number of activities all happening at the same time. This offers more choices and a chance for the older and younger children to partake in separate and more age-appropriate events. The Community Center houses a designated game room with pool, ping pong, fooseball, and air hockey; an arts and crafts room; an activity room with books, board games, legos, activity sheets, and more. 
