Main Street Academy Visits Franklin

Municipal Services Department Secretary -Marie Creasey-

The city of Franklin is proud to highlight one of our most dedicated employees - Marie Creasey. We asked her some personal questions and she graciously shared her fondest memories as a life long resident and employee in our great City.

Marie was born and raised in Franklin, new Hampshire. She lived at the end of Franklin Street with her parents, two brothers, and one sister. Sadly, her sister passed away from cancer in February 2017. Her grandparents (Memere and Pepere) on her Dad's side lived on River Street. Her grandparents (Grandma and Grandpa) on my Mom's side lived in Indianapolis. Marie anxiously shared that her Dad's sister married her Mom's brother. They lived in Indianapolis and had six children together.

We love to rewind the years, Marie! Please, continue...

Tell us what your fondest memories were growing up in Franklin?

Well, as you can imagine, with the four of us and the six of my cousins, there are thousands of memories! We visited my Memere and Pepere all the time. Christmas at their house, when the cousins would come here for the holidays, was a madhouse! Can you imagine pre-

sents (a lot of them home-made) for 10 kids? It was fun (for us kids)!!! Mem and Pep would always put an orange in all the stockings, which we thought was so cool. Our families traded off vacationing in NH and Indiana – that was fun to look forward to.

At home, we had a garden, and it was great to be able to pick carrots, wash them off at the outside faucet and munch away! We also grew beans and were forever picking and snapping them for either eating right away or canning for later.

There were many kids in our neighborhood to hang out with. We were outside every minute we could be! At 9 p.m., my Dad would whistle (very loudly) and, believe me, we would get home fast!

One of my most favorite memories in Indiana was helping my Grandpa feed his dogs. He bred and sold Irish Setter puppies. When he and my Grandma would visit NH, he would bring all his dogs (puppies included) and he would let them run (and attempt to train some of them!) in Old Hill Village. That was great to watch and participate in!

How long have you worked for the City of Franklin?

I started working for the City of Franklin on March 19, 1984, so I have completed 35 years. Where did that time go?! I started out with my time being divided between the City Clerks office, the Police Department and the Water Department (which was located on East Bow Street at the time). I was working for the State of NH when my Dad, who worked at the Fire Station in Franklin, let me know that a position was open at the Water Department. The former secretary had passed away and they were looking to fill that position. I applied and they gave me the job – the rest is history!

Do you remember your first day working for the City?

I don't really remember the first day working there, but one of my first memories is someone from City Hall calling and asking me when they were going to receive a certain report from me. My answer was "Uh, what report?"

Another memory I have is that the former secretary had all her file folders just set in the filing cabinets (because she knew where everything was that way)! I had to start my own filing system, which was probably a good thing in the long run.

This memory has nothing to do with work but, both times that I was pregnant, when it got down to a month before the due dates, my Dad would walk over from the Fire Station every morning and leave a note outside on the picture window here at work, with however many days left before the due dates! That was awesome.

Did anyone train you for your role, or did you just jump right in?

No-one was available to train me in the role, so I just jumped right in.

Were you comfortable right away or were you nervous?

I was a little nervous in the beginning, but I had great bosses right from the beginning, so that helped a lot!

How many calls or service requests do you answer or take in in a week or month, and when is your busy season at MSD?

An average number of calls or service requests that we take in during a month is 560+ calls. MSD's busy season – let's see - all year long! During the winter season, the snow keeps things hopping and during the summer season, all the road work and all work that can't be done during the winter is on the schedule.

What types of calls do you receive in an average month?

Our calls range from road conditions (potholes, trash dumped, driveway permits, digging permits etc.), tree questions, trash disposal questions, requests for additional trash cans, possible water leaks (either on the City side or homeowners side of the water line), requests for high bill re-reads, final readings for closings, sewer calls, water turn ons or shut offs for repairs etc.

Please tell us what you enjoy doing most when you are not servicing the City of Franklin.

I love spending time with my family. My husband (Tim) and I have been married for coming up on 32 years, which is awesome. He has a daughter (Robin) from a previous marriage and we have two kids – Jennifer and Joshua. My son and his fiancée have a new puppy, so Tim and I love to have them visit (not just because of the puppy, of course)! I love to read and enjoy doing puzzles. Both of our kids are getting married this year. Joshua is marrying Susie Whittemore on May 25th (which is coming up really fast!) and Jen is marrying Brian DuBreuil on October 5th (which is also coming up really fast!). It's a busy year, but very exciting!

It's an exciting time at the Franklin Fire Department. This March, we are pleased to welcome Deputy Chief David Hall to help lead our team. Dave comes to the Franklin Fire Department with many years of Fire Service experience. He gained his Fire and EMS knowledge with the Tilton Northfield and Belmont Fire Departments. Dave also chairs the Lakes Region Mutual Fire Aid Training Division. His passion and focus on training will prove useful to the City of Franklin.

This Spring, Franklin's Firefighters will be participating in Swiftwater Rescue training. This will take place in conjunction with area mutual aid partners. These training exercises will help to keep community members and visitors safe, in the event that a "Swiftwater" emergency occurs. As a reminder, please make sure to implement all safety precautions prior to using water for recreational activities.


We also recommend that all community members change their smoke detector batteries twice a year. Typically this should be done in the Spring and Fall. When the clocks get changed, so should the batteries. Though this reminder might be a few weeks late, we still want to remind our neighbors that it is not too late to complete this simple task.

One final note, to help improve efficiency when obtaining a campfire or cooking permit, all seasonal fire permits must be obtained online through the State of NH. These permits may be obtained at <u>https://nhdflweb.sovsportsnet.net/</u>. If you are unable to obtain online access, please visit the Franklin Public Library so a this can occur. Just as a reminder, anyone wishing to acquire a "one day" brush burning permit, must obtain it by visiting the Franklin Fire Station. Please be safe and enjoy the nice spring weather!

News from the Franklin, NH Municipal Services Department

OUR MISSION STATEMENT IS: "BETTER WORKING TOGETHER"

- In an effort to encourage debris removal from private property please review the City of Franklin, "Transfer Station Guidelines" which can be found on the Municipal Services Department webpage. Furniture and other materials containing plastics, artificial non-wood products, laminated wood, glue and adhesives, building materials treated with chemicals such as varnish, urethane, paint, plywood etc. is considered demolition material and must be disposed of in the demolition bin, for a fee, based on the weight of the item. There is no charge for clean wood waste. Untreated wood waste is ground and recycled. Leaves can be disposed at the leaf drop-off area at Rescue Road just before the Animal Shelter on the right.
- There continues to be a significant amount of work to do this spring, most of which is well underway as we approach Memorial Day. It was a hard winter on the M.S.D. crew, City equipment and the snow and ice budget. Cleanup of winter sand from our sidewalks and streets continue to be a top priority. Even though May weather is damp and dreary, we were able to get street pavement markings completed. Gravel roads are now dry enough to begin grading. Our first priority grading gravel roads is to go through a two-stage process, which consists of an initial grading and then return for more follow up work during the late spring and summer construction season. We have over 100 storm drains that need to be repaired! Catch basin cleaning begins the second week in July. Equipment repairs are also a continuous top priority. Parks and ball fields need to be maintained and mowed for spring sports. A lot to do in a short period of time! I am concerned about the workload and prioritizing these tasks so projects relating to "Public Safety" including drinking water and wastewater must take precedent.
- The "City of Franklin, NH, Sanitary Sewer Assessment " phases one and two are now complete. It is estimated that Franklin's waste water, which includes all non waste water known as Inflow and Infiltration, accounts for a year-round average of 2.5 million gallons per day.
- The United States Environmental Protection Agency requires that all Public Drinking Water Systems make available an annual "Consumer Confidence Report" to our water customers. In the past, reports were mailed to the "Owner of Record" for each property connected to a public water system. These reports will no longer be mailed. Beginning July 1, 2019, the annual report can be found on the City website on the M.S.D / Water Department homepage. In 2018 Franklin had no drinking water violations and we continue to get excellent performance from the Water Treatment Plant removing over 95% of the iron and manganese from our City drinking water.
- Many may ask if our City drinking water is safe. The City Water Department is classified as a "Public Water System". As a result, we must meet stringent guidelines established by the United States Environmental Protection Agency. We operate a federally permitted public water system established as a result of the 1972 "Clean Water Act". This ensures that public drinking water systems comply with safe drinking water standards. Franklin's drinking water is sampled every other week for bacteria, e-coli and other forms of contaminants. In addition, we sample for synthetic and organic chemicals, PFOA's, lead and copper. We draw over 214 water samples annually which are then tested in a certified lab and the results provided to the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services, Drinking Water Bureau. OUR WATER IS SAFE to drink and meets federally established testing requirements. This Annual "Consumer Confidence Report" will provide you with reassurance that the drinking water we produce and store is safe for consumption by humans and pets.

Municipal Services Update Continued...

- Most people are unaware of it takes to provide safe drinking water at adequate pressure requirements for domestic use by homeowners and to meet hydrant flows for fire protection. Over the past 14 years the City has had no choice but to upgrade various components of our water distribution system which includes the replacement and upgrade of tanks, water mains and service connections. Because of the City's topography, we operate a **complex system** with three separate pressure zones, five water tanks, five pumping stations, 57 miles of pipe, 4 well fields and a water treatment plant which has been online since July of 2012. In September of 2015 the Franklin Water Department was named "Water Utility of the Year" by the New England Water Works Association. The major challenge we face is that our 2,488-customer base must support the operation, maintenance and improvements to the system. Our average daily demand is 549,000 gallons of water. Unfortunately, our customer base is **disproportionate** to the vast amount of infrastructure in place that we must maintain. This has a significant impact on our water rates and resulting revenue it takes to operate and maintain the system. The cost to produce 748 gallons of safe drinking water is currently \$6.45. What does a bottle or gallon of store-bought water cost?
- Spring work on several road projects will be underway over the next few months. Prospect Street and New Hampton Road will be grader shimmed. Like most communities our roads and infrastructure continue to age. To be on a 20-year road program which would include 4 miles of paving a year an \$800,000 annual appropriation is necessary. Funding is just not available to accomplish this goal. This continues to be a major concern to all public works departments, state wide.
- A special request? Please rid your property of accumulated junk. The Transfer Station is located at 79 Punch Brook Road. The facility requires a free **residential** sticker upon proof of residency and is open Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday 7:30 A.M. to 3:00 P.M. Property maintenance makes a huge visual impact; increases property values and improves our standard of living within our neighborhoods. It also eliminates fire hazards; controls rodents and vector and keeps the owners of record in compliance with the "City's Property Maintenance Code".
- Helpful tips to assist the Municipal Services Department. We have over 1,200 catch basin covers that need constant maintenance by keeping them clean and free of debris. This is especially true when there is a prediction of heavy rainfall. Uncovered storm drains result in significant shoulder damage down grade of the catch basin designed to collect uphill storm water. If you have a driveway culvert or drain in proximity to your home or business please assist the city by helping us to keep them free of debris.
- Deputy Director Brian Barry has announced his retirement from the City effective June 30, 2019. Born and raised in Franklin, Brian is a "Jack of all Trades". Not only has Brian served the City for 24 years in the Municipal Services Department, but he was also a call Fireman for many years on the Franklin Fire Department. Although Brian is retiring from the City, he will be expanding his part time flooring business to full time. Brian is an excellent finish carpenter. We all will miss honesty; strong work ethic; even temperament in times of urgency; excellent attendance record and his tireless service to the various City Departments and the Citizenry of Franklin. We all wish him continued success and longevity. Thank you, Brian Barry, for your years of dedication!
- If anyone has ever been to the Municipal Services Department Office you have undoubtedly had the opportunity to be greeted by Marie Creasey. Marie is a native of Franklin; has been a fearless and faithful City employee since 1984; a wealth of knowledge and the hub to the seven spokes (seven divisions) that comprise the Municipal Services Department. I have 36 years as a Public Works Director working for three different municipalities. I must say that of all the assistants I have worked with over my career, Marie Creasey is on the top of my list. We all love her. She is honest; tough; keen; witty; a strong supporter of the City and goes above and beyond the call of duty. This is especially true when critical situations arise. All of us in the Municipal Service Department are a tight knit group and it is people like Marie that keep us on track. Three cheers for Marie!!! We look forward to her continued service and positive attitude as we move ahead.

Public Works Memorial Dedication



The Franklin Parks and Recreation's Summer Program is based out of the Bessie Rowell Community Center. The Bessie Rowell Community Center provides ample room for both sunny day and rainy day activities. With multiple classrooms, the gym, and the stage, our participants have plenty of space to spread out and take part in a number of activities all happening at the same time. This offers more choices and a chance for the older and younger children to partake in separate and more age-appropriate events. 


