Revitalization Update

Two Franklin projects win CRDC Grants

Downtown revitalization is goal of Mill City Park, PermaCityLife BY NHBR STAFF

The Capital Regional Development Council, recently awarded a total of \$10,000 to two separate initiatives aimed at reviving downtown Franklin. Through its Community Grant Program, CRDC awarded Mill City Park at Franklin Falls \$5,000 to help fund the development of a master plan for 9.32 acres of land surrounding the Winnipesaukee River that would the park, which is part of a larger development project in the city that involves creation of New England's first whitewater park. Initial plans for Mill City Park include a community garden, event space, picnic area, historic mill run trail, interconnection to the Winnipesaukee River Trail, mountain bike pump track system and an eco-village area.

The Mill City Park Master Plan is expected to take three months, said Marty Parichand, executive director of Mill City Park at Franklin Falls. "A portion of the park already exists, but the way it is now, it's not very welcoming," said Parichand. "Our goal is to make Franklin a destination spot for not only outdoor enthusiasts through the waterpark and adjacent biking trails but to also revitalize the downtown." The second \$5,000 grant was awarded to PermaCityLife, a Franklin nonprofit that owns seven downtown block buildings and is also working to revitalize the city's downtown. Grant funding through CRDC will help support its condo conversion plan with the goal of converting three mill buildings into eight commercial and five residential units. The condo conversion plan is expected to deliver prepared site plans and surveys, legal documents required by the Franklin Planning Board for approval The Franklin grants weren't the only ones awarded through CRDC's Community Grant Program, which funded five additional projects in Merrimack, Sullivan and Hillsborough Counties with a total of \$26,230 in grants.

They include:

- Funds for Sullivan County to explore the feasibility of cheese and mushroom production at a root cellar located on the county farm
- An economic development survey for the town of Amherst that will focus on short- and long-term economic development goals
- Funding to help with architecture design plans for a new facility for the West Claremont Center for Music & the Arts
- A grant for the Merrimack County Conservation District to help support the purchase of a freezer/refrigeration unit for their Capital Area Local Food Initiative
- Funding to support operations at the Manchester Makerspace.

 "The primary focus of CRDC's Community Grant Program is to support projects and programs that lead to job creation/retention and enhance a community's tax base while providing a public benefit," said Chris Wellington, CRDC's project management officer.

Summer 2018 - News from the Franklin, NH Municipal Services Department

• Solid Waste and Recycling Update: In March of 2018 Material Recovery / Recycling Facilities throughout the northeast, and nationwide, started to experience a dramatic decline in the demand for most types of recyclable materials. This has affected almost every community that provides single stream recycling collection services. Simply stated, the bottom has fallen out for the demand and marketability of recyclable products. Back in 2010, when the City of Franklin, NH added curbside single stream recycling as a service, the City was getting paid for our product at a rate of \$40 per ton. The market was strong and demand was high. As a result, the City was able to offset its disposal costs, enabling us to pay off a 7-year loan for solid waste collection equipment that we had lease/purchased. Enter 2018; the market has taken a 180 turn! The current tipping fee price to dispose of our recyclables is ranging from \$129 to \$140 per ton. When this increase in recycling tipping costs took place, the program began to operate in a deficit.

Based on the above, I was forced to look at a more cost effective means to cover the increased cost to dispose of our recyclables. PLEASE NOTE that until the recycling market recovers and tipping prices drop, we will be diverting our recyclable products to the Wheelabrator Trash to Energy Facility. This facility is burning solid waste, which in turn produces electricity, which is then sold to Eversource. To sum it up, the only way our current program has changed is where the material is taken and how our recyclables are utilized.

Please use the following guidelines for trash and recycling curbside collection until further notice:

Both recycling and regular trash containers will be picked up by the same refuse vehicle. We encourage residents to continue separating acceptable recyclables into the green lid container and bagging acceptable regular trash into the gray lid container. Our Recycling Program will be reviewed every quarter looking at the market and tipping prices. Thank you for your patience as we work through this temporary change.

Franklin Transfer Station rules for drop off remain in effect. If you wish to recycle, the roll off compactor, adjacent to the Transfer Station Building, is still available for disposal of your loose single stream recycling and all items that are not acceptable for curbside pickup. Copies of our "Transfer Station Guidelines" are available at the Transfer Station or on the City Website, which is franklinnh.org.

City disposal of Solid Waste and Recycling is a big topic that City Staff will be re-visiting this fall with residents and the City Council. A series of workshops is being planned for mid-fall. STAY TUNED!

• The City Water Department will begin another major project to be funded in part by the State of New Hampshire Drinking Water, State Revolving Fund Loan/Grant Program. The project is to replace an antiquated pressure reducing chamber on Pleasant Street. The current structure was built 30 years ago and has been a continuous operational/maintenance issue for our Water Department employees. The project will include demolition and replacement of the existing structure and replacing it with a new fifteen by twenty foot subsurface building, along with new piping and valve configuration. The building access will also be safer and equipment more accessible. Total Project Cost - \$340,000. The contract is due to be awarded late July.

- A second Water Department project nearing completion is the "Rehabilitation of the Sanbornton Pumping Station." This project replaces pumps, motors, internal piping, electrical upgrades, scada instrumentation, and chemical-feed systems. This work is long overdue, as this pumping station has been operating with equipment dating back to the 1940's.
- The Highway Division continues to work on numerous projects, some of which have been on the "to do" list for many years. Many of these projects involve drainage projects, focusing on critical drainage areas of infrastructure.
- Brush from private and City property, especially at intersections, can interfere with a drivers line of sight. Although we perform roadside mowing and brush cutting, we are not able to enter private property. If you have such a situation, it would be great if you could prune back the vegetation to improve sight distance. Also, if you have hazardous trees that pose a potential risk to the public way, removal should be considered.
- The "City of Franklin, NH, Sanitary Sewer Assessment Study", which is being performed by Underwood Engineering, is entering its' third year. After identifying major areas of fresh water intrusion "infiltration" into the system, we have initiated televising the condition of 32 miles of City Sanitary Sewer Lines. Flow isolation was also performed. The next step is to develop a construction and maintenance plan, which targets areas of critical concern, with the objective of reducing the infiltration of non-wastewater into the system. This is another topic that will involve a workshop between City Staff and the City Council.
- Road Resurfacing projects have been identified, but at the time of this newsletter, I am unable to provide you with a definitive list until we perform our fieldwork and cost estimating.
- I am hearing about and have concerns with misinformation being given over social media websites. To help clarify any questions, please put your questions in writing to me by postal mail addressed to the City of Franklin Municipal Services Department, 43 West Bow Street, Franklin, NH 03235.
- The "Haynes Brook Culvert Replacement Project", at the intersection of Central Street and Hannaford's Plaza, is now complete after 13 years of waiting for a bid that was within our budget. This was a complex project, involving a great deal of coordination and planning among various utilities and government agencies.

Your cooperation and patience is greatly appreciated.




